Syracuse University is located in Syracuse, New York which is located in the heart of New York State and is commonly referred to as Central New York (CNY). CNY is within easy driving distance of Toronto, Boston, Montreal, and New York City. Playing in the Central New York area means enjoying lakes and rivers, Mountains and countryside, arts and culture, and spectator sports-all within an easy drive. Head northwest to Oswego, a picturesque town on Lake Ontario, and explore Revolutionary War history at Fort Ontario and tour the harbor. Oswego County offers beaches, boating, and world-class salmon and steelhead fishing. The New York State Thruway leads east to Utica, home of the Munson-Williams-Proctor Arts Institute. Lift a glass of Saranac beer after a tour of Matt Brewing Company, New York's oldest. to the southeast, Cazenovia beckons with trendy shops and eateries, Artisans, and Lorenzo Mansion Historic Site. Picturesque U.S. 20 winds eastward through some of the best antique shopping around, with more than 1,000 dealers in a field along a two-mile stretch at Madison-Bouckville. Travel Interstate 81 south to Labrador Mountain Ski Area in Truxton. Three Peaks and 22 trails await skiers and snowboarders. Southwest of Syracuse is Skaneateles, an elegant village on a pristine lake. A short drive west of Skaneateles is Auburn, home of abolitionist and escaped slave Harriet Tubman and a stop on the underground Railroad.

One of the more distinctive bumps along Syracuse's skyline is the puffy white roof of the Syracuse University Carrier Dome, the only domed stadium of its kind in the Northeast United States or on any college campus in the country. The 50,000-seat dome gives a huge home-team advantage to the school's basketball, football, and lacrosse teams and plays host to major concerts and community events.

If you share a passion for great golf, the CNY area is where you can find both. With more than 40 public courses, more than any other region in the Northeast, the Syracuse area may just be the last unsung golf mecca in America.

CNY is host to over 147 festivals and events. Every summer Syracuse hosts the Syracuse Jazz Festival which have included such artists as Kenny G., Aretha Franklin, Chaka Khan, Smokey Robinson, Lou Rawls, Natalie Cole, and Ray Charles.

One thing that makes everyone happy in Central New York is the variety of dining options you'll find. Virtually every cuisine can be found with something to satisfy every appetite from a taste of French cuisine to Thai to the best barbeque.

CNY hosts numerous fine wineries. The wine district is centered on four primary lakes: Canandaigua, Cayuga, Seneca and Keuka, all just a short drive from Syracuse.
